Gaggle Announces New Audio Feedback System for Student Email

BLOOMINGTON, IL – Gaggle.Net, the leading provider of safe student email to school districts across the country, has released its new Audio Feedback System (AFS). The new AFS enables users (students, teachers, and parents) to receive audible reinforcement to all outbound and inbound emails, blogs and message board posts. Gaggle.Net is the first company to provide student users with the ability to have emails read aloud to them, providing audible reinforcement for writing success.

In the past, Gaggle.Net's web-based student communication system has provided visual learning tools to students. Now with the AFS, the system will help target students who are auditory learners by giving them the option to hear their emails read back to them. Users can have their outbound emails read out, enabling students to hear their mistakes before the message is sent. It's another way to encourage students to proof read their own emails before sending. The Audio Feedback System will also read received emails, blog entries and message board posts.

The emergence of a large number of English Language Learners (ELL) is one of the major challenges facing schools today. This same AFS feature will be available through Gaggle's teacher and student blogs. When a user creates a blog entry, they will be able to have that entry read back to them before it is posted. Likewise, visitors to a user's blog can have the blog entries read to them. In fact, a user's Gaggle Blog can act as a personal podcast when it is listened to through the internet. This provides an easy way for users to produce a podcast without any extra equipment. With the Audio Feedback System, blog entries can be saved to the local hard drive as an MP3 file. This gives students another option in the creation of their E-portfolios.
